IT was nonsense to compare the evacuation of Jenderam in Selangor with the razing of the Czech town of Lidice by the Germans in 1942, said the Director of Information, Mr. J. N. McHugh, today.

He was commenting on a Manchester Guardian editorial which said that Communist propaganda would try to make Jenderam as notorious as Lidice and Guernica, the Spanish town where thousands of civilians were killed in a bombing raid in 1937.

Mr. McHugh said: "It may well be true that Communist propagandists will distort the facts about the removal of people from Jenderam and their resettlement in an area where they will no longer be under the daily menace of bandit terrorists.

"But to compare this action with the murder of civilians by air bombardment in Spain or with the massacre of villagers by the Nazis is nonsensical."

Malays Pleased

But this was unlikely to deter the Communist propagandists, who continuously referred to the murder of innocent Malayan civilians by terrorists as "liberation".

Another Government official said that during the High Commissioner's tour of Selangor yesterday and today he had spoken to many Malays who had been pleased at the removal of this kampong.

Before action was taken against Jenderam, considerable pressure had been brought to bear on Government by responsible Malays in Selangor to deal with what they considered "an absolute cancer."

At the detention camp in Johore the people of Jenderam would be screened and separated. Those found to have been unwilling supporters of the bandits and who showed a real desire to co-operate with Government would be resettled.

The other class, Malays and Chinese, who formed most of those removed from Jenderam, had condemned themselves and shown that they were unworthy citizens of this country, said the spokesman. "This class merits deportation and those who cannot be dealt with should be detained during the emergency."


