### Not enough room in detention camps

KUALA LUMPUR, Saturday.

A LONELY, uninhabited island off the coast of Borneo is to be turned into an exile island for Chinese detainees, now in detention camps in Federation, who face banishment or deportation orders.

Government is negotiating with the North Borneo Government, through the Commissioner-General, Mr. Malcolm MacDonald, for the use of the island, it is understood.

The lease of the Borneo island is urgent because of the refusal of the Chinese Government to allow Chinese who have been banished or deported to land in China.

A recent Peking announcement warned shipping companies and captains that they would not be allowed to disembark banishees or deportees in Chinese ports.

INDIA may face a famine in six weeks if America does not send 2,000,000 tons of good grain in time, a Government spokesman said today.

"India has been banking on it," he said. He described reports of increasing Congressional opposition to the grant as "depressing."

The accommodation situation in detainee camps in the Federation is acute. The raid on Jenderam and the removal of 1,500 from the area to the detention camp at Kluang has meant a great drain on all available space.

Because accommodation is scarce in the camps and because it is considered politically bad for Communists to be kept in the same camp, the island project has been mooted. It could also solve the problem of finding guards for the deportees.

The expenditure was approved by the Finance Committee on a Certificate of Emergency.

There are 11,530 detainees in camps in the Federation. Only some of these are Communists.

At present, systematic grading of detainees is taking place in all camps. Detainees are divided into black, grey and white groups, according to the degree of their Communist indoctrination.

The "blacks" are rabid Communists who are considered incapable of being "converting." These are to be sent to the island exile off Borneo or to the Ipoh detention camp.

The "greys" more likely to be converted and will be sent to Taiping rehabilitation camp or elsewhere for instruction. They might eventually be freed.

The "whites" are to be sent to Tanjong Bruas in Malacca where they will be further re-examined for release.
