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BUSUT, A 'RED' VILLAGE, PAYS THE PENALTY

KUALA LUMPUR, Monday.
POLICE and military today swooped on the
Min Yuen-riddled area of Busut in South

Selangor and cordoned it off before removing
450 men, women and children to a resettlement
area.

It was a smaller, less severe Jenderam,
although a spokesman of the South Selangor War
Executive Committee admitted that the area's
record was almost — though not quite — as bad as
Jenderam's.

Mortar shells boomed all
through the morning as a
section of the First Suffolks
fired round after round from
the centre of the area at a
group of 30 bandits who fled
north as the troops moved in.

Otherwise there were no
incidents during the raid,
except that amid the shelling
and the evacuation, a baby
was born to a 42-year-old
Hainanese tapper's wife, Yang
Tun Wah, before the dresser
could arrive.

The official reason for the
people of Busut not being
sent to a detention camp —
as the people of Jenderam
were — was "there is not so
much proof. We will have to
give them the benefit of the
doubt."

It is understood, however, that
had there been sufficient accommo-
dation in detention camps in the
Federation, a different penalty

Tomorrow they will be removed from their area to Sungai Chua, near Kajang, where they will become "prisoners" within the Kajang mukim.

They cannot move outside the mukim.

The indictment against the people of Busut lists five general crimes:

1. Harboursing bandits;
2. Complicity in bandit crimes;
3. Failing to supply information about bandits in the area;

4. Supplying food to the bandits; and

5. Subscribing to bandit funds.

More particularly, the spokesman of the South Selangor War Executive Committee said today, the people of Busut had paid \$900 a

month to the bandits for several months. Everyone of the 60 families paid monthly dues.

There have been 37 major incidents in the district from the time the Emergency was declared. A number of people have been murdered and both the managers of the adjoining Lothian and Bute estates have been shot at, and one of them wounded.

Massed meetings of the Min Yuen had been held in the area and the police had evidence that as many as 150 people had assembled at the district coffeeshop for this purpose.

The Busut school had flown the three-star Communist flag repeatedly.

Police know that the notorious Kajang bandit leader, Liew Kong Kim, has lived near the area and has been helped by the residents.

The operation against Busut began last night when the First Suffolks and police formed a cordon round the three-mile by two-mile area. No one was allowed in or out.

Pamphlets were distributed to all householders telling them of the forced evacuation and ordering them to be ready to move in
